



- Recipe Box

Did you know that WSL published a cookbook, "Enjoy! Recipes from the Women's Symphony League of Austin," in 1980? This charming red and white hardcover cookbook contains a treasure trove of hundreds of recipes contributed by WSL members, and also includes a special section of recipes shared by beloved local restaurants. A handful of the very favorite recipes in the book were even deemed worthy of The Golden Baton Award, and we couldn't agree more! The holidays may be over, but soup season is not! As Austin faces some of its chilliest weather of the year, cozy up with a scrumptious bowl of cheese soup from the iconic 1886 Cafe at The Driskill.

1886 ROOM CHEESE SOUP

1/4 cup butter

1/2 cup finely chopped onion

1/2 cup finely chopped carrot

1/2 cup finely chopped celery

1/4 cup flour

1 1/2 tablespoon cornstarch

1/8 teaspoon baking soda

4 cups milk - room temperature 4 cups chicken stock - room temperature

1 lb. processed cheese (Old English), cut in pieces

1 teaspoon salt

White pepper

1 Tablespoon dried parsley

Dash cayenne pepper

Dash paprika (optional)

Melt butter in heavy saucepan. Saute vegetables until tender. Stir in flour and cornstarch. Cook until bubbly. Add stock and milk gradually, blending into a smooth sauce. Add baking soda and cheese pieces. Stir until thickened. Season with salt and pepper. Add parsley.

Before serving, heat thoroughly in a double boiler do not boil.

Garnish with paprika.

Serves 6-8.

Upon completing her entry year, Olivia, with a

technology background from Compass Real Estate and Accenture, realized her natural path of service was to join the Technology Committee. In working closely with then VP of Technology, Sinem Szygenda, she worked on the WSL website with Neon to bring everything (including Jewel Ball tickets) online as well as worked diligently on the public facing and the back-end websites. In 2021, when the WSL had to pivot from the traditional in-person Jewel Ball due to the pandemic, Olivia was instrumental in making the virtual fundraiser, Yule Ball, a huge success. 

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Crescent City Celebration JEWEL BALL 2021





















After a one year postponement due to Covid, the **66th Annual Jewel Ball** was a true cause for celebration. On Saturday, September 18, 2021 more than 1,100 people gathered at the Fairmont Austin for a night of festivities inspired by the incomparable city of **New Orleans**. The thematic elements of the Jewel Ball were thoughtfully carried out throughout the evening, from the signature hurricane cocktail, to the brass band comprised of Katrina refugees which played during the pre-ball reception, to the menu, and even to the color-coordinated Mardi Gras "throws" which were in much evidence on the dance floor.

The evening officially kicked off with one of New Orleans' most beloved traditions, when Jermaine Devezin of the Ninth Ward Black Hatchet Mardi Gras Indian Tribe led a memorable Second Line parade into the Manchester Ballroom. Guests were absolutely delighted to discover lagniappe at each table, two bottles of wine generously donated by Twin Liquors and the Jabour Family. The main focus of the evening, the presentation of the

Royal Court, was a wonderful continuation of an important and long-standing tradition. King Brio LV, David Warren Douglas, presided over the historic coronation of the **two Diamond Queens**, Mary Catherine Dickerson and Annabelle Grier Hubert, nine Austin Princesses and their Escorts, eight Visiting Jewels and Escorts, and more than 140 Junior Royalty participants. As WSL President Jennifer Bell shared, "It was wonderful to get to know so many amazing ladies in the planning of the Ball! I was especially honored to share the experience with my family. The Jewel Ball has been a family tradition for 50 years, when my mother-in-law, Pamela Bell, joined the WSL."

Following the Royal Court presentation, Heath Hale and his Cowboy Auctioneers presided over an entertaining and competitive **live auction**, which included a few fun treats. One of the best moments of the live auction was when Anat Adi-Atias of Diamonds Direct surprised one winning bidder on the spot with a strand of pearls for every lady seated at the table!

Following the beloved Father-Daughter dance, partygoers had myriad entertainment options, including family photos on stage, casino games, and dancing the night away to the sounds of Stratosphere Band. "After the cancellation of the 2020 Ball, and the uncertainty of whether or not we could carry on planning the 2021 Ball, it was extremely rewarding to see so much of the WSL community turn out the night of the Ball. Everyone was so happy to be in each other's presence celebrating the traditions we hold dear," explained Jewel Ball Co-Chair, Stacey McLeod Brewer.

Another unanticipated obstacle pertained to the Junior Royalty dresses. "Due to supply chain constraints and severely limited dress selection and availably, we thought we were exercising an abundance of caution by sourcing fabric locally and working with an Austin designer to create and fabricate our dresses," said Jewel Ball Co-Chair, Meredith Presley Wood. Unfortunately, less than ten days before the Ball, the designer let the Ball Chairs know that he would be unable to finish the dresses pursuant to his contract. To

make matters even worse, the Chairs soon discovered that the dresses were far less complete than had been reported by the designer. "It is not an exaggeration to say that **Victoria Cundiff** of **Fashion Alterations** saved the Jewel Ball," Meredith said. "Victoria hired every available seamstress in Austin, farmed these dresses out all over the city, and heroically came through for every single one of these young women. Victoria also refused to charge any markup whatsoever for these extraordinary efforts, beyond covering her labor costs, since so many of her regular clientele are members of the WSL."

An evening more than two years in the making, inspired by a magical and iconic city, and honoring those families who proudly support the Austin Symphony Orchestra and its programs, the 66th Annual Jewel Ball was another successful chapter in a long-standing and proud Austin philanthropic tradition.

Rhonda Hissey WSL MEMBER SINCE 2016

How did you first learn of WSL, and what motivated you to want to join? I met Meredith Wood at Casner Christian Academy when both of our youngests were in the kindergarten class together. We were so excited to learn we were neighbors! In fact, three kids from our small neighborhood were in the same class, and my daughter became fast friends with these two neighborhood boys ("the 3 Stooges"). When else do you provide a meal and clean up and receive a standing ovation or get serenaded on stage?

Do you have a favorite WSL story or memory? Some of my favorite WSL memories include watching my two daughters walk the runway at the Red Haute Valentine event (my older daughter definitely doesn't share these sentiments!) and seeing the photos that Susan Lambert took of my 5-year old dancing with Meredith's 5-year old at their first Jewel Ball together. They were so darn cute that I regret not seeing them dance in person!

What has been a highlight of your time in the WSL? The success of the new format for the WSL Fashion Luncheon. Three years ago, I co-chaired the event with Jennifer Vinklarek and





Meredith Wood. Due to extinuating circumstances, a new format was needed from the traditional formal runway show. Meredith had the idea of a speaker and was succesful in getting Tim Gunn from Project Runway. We paired his interview with informal modeling from Neiman Marcus and a pick-a-prize game with Kendra Scott jewelry. Despite the initial reaction of "what have I gotten myself into?", it turned out to be a great experience and a memory that I'll cherish. I am proud of the accomplishment and loved getting to know so many wonderful members that served on the board or the Jewel Ball committee that year. Later we learned the event won the TASO (Texas Associaton of Symphony Orchestras) gold award which was just icing on the cake.

What are your favorite places in Austin? Some of my favorite places in Austin are still Mt. Bonnell and the UT Tower deck. I love being able to see so much of our beloved city at once. I recently took my dad to the Texas Military Forces Museum at Camp Mab-

ry and loved it. We've always shared an interest in war history and touring college campuses together.

The Texas Association for Symphony Orchestras, or TASO, is an organization designed to promote, develop, and support symphony orchestras across the state of Texas. TASO was founded by Dallas member Juanita Miller on March 13, 1967 and is still going strong today. TASO is currently composed of over 23 voting member organizations, each of which is allowed a representative on the board of directors. Additional support for the organization is provided by its 27 affiliates and patrons (non-voting members).

The members that make up TASO include large Texas cities like Houston, Dallas, and Austin, as well as smaller towns like San Angelo, Tyler, Big Spring, College Station/Brazos Valley, and everything in between! The board meets quarterly each year, three times in Dallas and once more each at the site of its annual conference, which rotates among member cities. This affords all the member organizations the opportunity to see different cities, orchestras, and volunteers. The 55th annual Conference will be held April 28 - May 1 in Lubbock. In 2020, co-chairs **Susan Douglas** and **Beth Grimm** worked hard to host the event in Austin, but sadly had to cancel due to the pandemic. Susan is currently serving as President and Beth has served in numerous roles in TASO over the years.

Each year at its annual conference TASO recognizes and celebrates outstanding contributions to the arts, specifically music and symphonies, through its Awards of Excellence. Each member organization is eligible to apply for the opportunity to present projects in communications and technology, education, fundraising, or leadership and service at the annual conference. Member organizations may also nominate businesses, patrons, legislators, and volunteers for the Award of Excellence. These awards are given annually and are presented at the spring conference. Austin

has had 21 distinguished individuals/ corporate citizens recognized with these awards over the past 25 years. In 2021, WSL of Austin was honored to receive a Project Award for "A Modern Websites for Modern Times" and an award in the Volunteer category recognizing former TASO President and longtime WSL member Anna Marie Speir for her commitment and countless hours of extraordinary service. In 2022, WSL is presenting the award winning "Symphony Sips" and "Yule Ball" at the annual confer**ence.** We look forward to presenting these successful activities to the other TASO members and sharing these wonderful ideas!

TASO also sponsors an annual state vouth concerto competition in Dallas each year. Named after Founder Juanita Miller of Dallas, the concerto was held in Dallas on Sunday, January 9, 2022. At the concerto, high school musicians from across the state had the opportunity to compete before a select panel of judges from elite musical institutions. The musicians submitted their audition tapes for pre-screening for the judges to review. The final 10-15 finalists then competed among three categories- Strings, Winds/Brass, and Piano. Pianist Bryant Li from Katy, TX was the grand prize winner, and will have the opportunity to play as a guest performer in the symphony of one of the participating cities. It is a treasured event and opportunity for budding musicians throughout Texas!

TASO continues to serve its members by providing ongoing opportunities for member organizations to gather and share information of mutual benefit with each other. We are so fortunate in WSL to have such great representation from our committed volunteers that make our organization shine while also sharing creativity and success with members from other cities for their benefit of the arts and symphonies of Texas!
